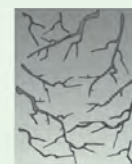
Wastehauler's Pick-Up

Fall Branch Collection - Monday, September 22th



On Monday, September 22nd, the Village will be providing a branch pickup. This is an opportunity for residents to get rid of branches, trimmings or small trees that have been removed. The Village has hired a contractor to drive through the Village and pick up and dispose of this material. There is no fee for this service so this is a great opportunity to cut down and get rid of your buckthorn and other dead or declining woody vegetation.

To participate in this program:

- Only cut branches or trees (smaller than 6 inches) will be collected. (Note that some small twigs and leaves may be too small to be chipped.)
- All cut material to be collected must be placed at the curb by 7:00 a.m., Monday, September 22nd. The contractor will do his best to get it picked up from your property by Friday, September 26th.
- Participants may begin placing material at the curb on Saturday, September 20th. Care should be taken to keep material out of the street. All material must be on the owner's property.
- Branches must be placed perpendicular to the curb with the cut end facing the street. Material may be stacked, but all cut ends must face the street.
- Do not bundle or tie the material together. (If you are placing material at the curb for Waste Management, and you have landscape collection, you are required to bundle it. Do not place that material in the same area where you will be placing branches which are being collected by the Village contractor.)
- No root balls, lawn clippings or other landscape waste will be collected.
- In the event of rain there may be a delay in collecting the material. Please note that the material will be picked up as soon as it is possible.
- Be advised that there may be small twigs and leaves left behind. It is the responsibility of the participant to collect and dispose of all material that is too small to be chipped or is left behind.

This program was very successful last year, and we anticipate similar participation in 2008. Your patience during this process will be greatly appreciated.

Ask for Phosphate Free Fertilizer!

All of us contribute water to local storm sewers, detention ponds and regional waterways. The water runs off of our properties, after irrigation or rain events, into the stormsewers, into detention ponds and regional waterways. This water contains chemicals that have washed off of our lawns, driveways and roofs. These chemicals are choking our lakes, ponds and streams.

There is one simple thing we can all do that will make a huge improvement to our waterways. Use lawn care products that **DO NOT CONTAIN PHOSPHORUS**. If you do not maintain your own lawn and/or gardens, please talk to your landscaper and request lawn care products that do not contain phosphorus. Phosphorus in fertilizers and other products clogs detention ponds, streams, lakes and rivers with green algae growth.

When looking for fertilizer there are usually three numbers on the bag. The middle number should be zero. Two of the most frequently purchased phosphorus-free fertilizers are Scotts, Turf Builder Zero P and Sur-Gro Inc's Vigoro Ultra Turf. Not all stores carry phosphorus-free products, but the following stores do:

Some lawn care companies which provide phosphorus-free treatments are:

TruGreen ChemLawn, Lawn Doctor, Scott's Lawn Services, McGinty Brothers, Turf Care Enterprises, NatureScapeLawn and Landscape Care.

Ask your lawn care company to use phosphorus-free products. If you would like the Village to provide them with more information about phosphorus free products, call the Village and give us the name and contact information for your lawn care company. Flood Safety



Listed below are suggestions regarding flood safety and issues you should be aware of:

- Do not walk through flowing water. Drowning is the number one cause of flood deaths. Currents can be deceptive. If you walk in standing water, be sure to use a pole or stick ensuring that firm ground is ahead.
- Do not drive through a flooded area. This includes road barriers. Barriers are there for your protection.
- Stay away from power lines and electrical wires. The number two flood killer after drowning is electrocution. Electrical current travels through water. If you see downed power lines, report them immediately to the Village Police Department by dialing 911.
- Have your electricity turned off by Commonwealth Edison. If you have been flooded you should be aware that some appliances, such as televisions, hold electrical charges even after they have been unplugged.
- Do not use appliances or motors that have been wet unless they have been cleaned and checked by a professional. Commonwealth Edison's phone number is 1-800-Edison 1 (1-800-334-7661).
- Be alert for gas leaks. Use a flashlight to inspect for damage. Do not smoke or use candles, lanterns, or open flames unless you know the gas has been turned off and the area has been ventilated. (Peoples Energy-North Shore Gas' emergency phone number is 1-866-556-6005.)
- Look out for animals. Small animals or reptiles that have been flooded out of their homes may seek shelter in your home.

Preparation is very important in any emergency situation. Please be aware of things you can do to alleviate flooding in your area. Plan ahead and feel free to contact the Village of Lincolnshire Police Department or Public Works Department with any questions you may have.

Senior Citizen Tax Relief

If you are a senior citizen, sixty-five years or older, residing in a single family residence, individual condominium or townhouse upon which you are obligated to pay real estate property taxes, and if your total income from any source does not exceed what the IRS has benchmarked as the maximum allowable social security benefit that a "household" can receive, then you are eligible for senior citizen tax relief (applies only on the Village's portion of the property tax).

Frank Tripicchio, is Retiring!



The Director of Public Works, Frank Tripicchio, will be retiring effective Wednesday, September 3, 2008, from his responsibilities here at the Village of Lincolnshire. We are planning a reception for Frank at the Village Hall, in the Community Room, on Wednesday, September 3rd, from 3:30 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. **You are invited.**

Frank joined the Village as the Water & Sewer Foreman on December 4, 1984; on June 30, 1986 he was appointed as Acting Parks Foreman, maintaining his duties as Water & Sewer Foreman. He was again promoted to the position of Superintendent of Public Works for Operations in April, 1988, and on January 15, 1996, he was promoted to the position of Director of Public Works, which is the position he holds today.

As the Director of Public Works, Frank's responsibilities are divided into seven major areas of responsibility: Streets and Drainage; Water & Sewer; Buildings; Parks and Grounds; Engineering; Vehicle Maintenance; and Recreation. These seven interlocking pieces of his responsibilities all provide an essential service to the entire community. He ensures that your water is delivered, your waste is removed, your roads are passable, and your recreational opportunities are limitless. The Director supervises a staff of 25 full-time and 29 seasonal employees.

The Village, under Frank's direction, is the recipient of awards too numerous to mention, both local and national. Frank was named one of the Top Ten Public Works Leaders of the Year in the Chicago Metro Chapter APWA as well as in the Lake Branch of Chicago Metro Chapter. He received the Lincolnshire Chamber of Commerce's Outstanding Public Service Award (2002); the Lincolnshire Garden Club Outstanding Achievement and Exemplary Service Award (2002); and the Village of Lincolnshire Employee of the Year award, (2007).

Jennifer Hughes is promoted to Director of Public Works



On September 4, 2008, Village Engineer Jennifer Hughes will succeed Frank Tripicchio as the Village's Director of Public Works. Frank is retiring after a successful 36-year career in public service.

Jennifer started her career with the Village in 1997. Previously, she worked for the Indiana Department of Transportation and a private consulting firm in Indiana. She is a 1988 graduate of the University of Notre Dame.

In 2000, Jennifer was named "Employee of the Year" for the Village of Lincolnshire. She is the recipient of the 2006 "Floodplain Manager of the Year" award from the Illinois Association of Floodplain and Stormwater Management. She has served on the Community Rating System Task Force since 2006, representing all local officials nationwide on the committee that determines flood insurance discounts based upon the nation's floodplain regulations.

Jennifer will continue to serve in her capacity as Village Engineer.

Nature's Edge



Lincolnshire is known for its beautiful forested residential area and its pristine natural areas. In addition to making our community a beautiful place, our trees also protect us.

Trees remove pollution from the air. The leaf surfaces absorb or trap pollutants. The pollutants that are absorbed are broken down by gases inside the leaves. The pollutants that are trapped are simply collected on the leaf surface and later rinsed off by rain to the soil below. (Studies have shown that larger trees are more efficient in pollution removal than small trees – special care needs to be taken to ensure your mature trees are well cared for.)

Have you noticed that when you walk into a forest the temperature is cooler? Trees have the ability to lower the ambient temperature. This is accomplished when the leaves absorb or reflect light from the sun. In addition, trees reduce energy requirements for buildings. During the summer months, shade from trees will reduce the amount of heat getting to the building which will help to reduce the need for air conditioning. During the winter months, our trees block wind and cold reducing the need for heat.

Trees provide shade in our yards which helps to reduce the amount of water needed to keep our grass or perennials healthy in the hot summer months. They also help to absorb water so that less stormwater runs off into our streets and sewers.

Recent difficulties with Dutch Elm Disease and the possibility of Emerald Ash Borer make it imperative that we inventory our existing trees and determine what our future needs will be. Many of us have large numbers of ashes and elms on our properties. You may want to start now to plant other species of trees so that, by the time the ashes and elms are depleted, you have a new forest on the way. Another consideration is to plant trees that are more compatible with the change in climate. As our climate gets warmer tree species that were common in southern Illinois will be more common in the north.

A collaboration between the Chicago Botanic Garden, the Morton Arboretum and ChicagoLand Grows, Inc. has yielded plant and tree cultivars which are best suited to our region. If you visit the Morton Arboretum web site (www.mortonarb.org), you can learn how to select trees for your property based on your site conditions. In addition, the Chicagoland Grows website (www.chicagolandgrows.org) will provide you with a list of trees, shrubs and perennials that were developed for our region. These species are good performers. The elms listed on their tree list are resistant to Dutch Elm Disease.

Look to the future and how you can keep your trees growing and healthy so they in turn can keep you healthy!

Chilly Evenings are Coming!

It won't be long before crackling blazes begin filling local fireplaces. However, before loading up your built-in or free-standing fireplace for the season's first burn, be sure all of its systems are safe. This means inspecting the chimney for deposits of creosote left by last winter's fires, and thoroughly removing them.

Because the creosote fire burns very intensely, and hot, due to being fanned by the upward rush of super-heated smoke-laden air, there's a chance that the structural system of your attic and/or roof could catch fire if creosote, lining your chimney walls, were to ignite.

Regular chimney cleaning and maintenance are more important now than ever because of the growing popularity of free-standing woodburning stoves. Owners are unaware of their dangers and maintenance requirements.

If you have a masonry chimney, make sure there are not loose bricks or mortar. If there are, have repairs made before you build your first fire this fall.

If the idea of cleaning your chimney yourself holds little appeal, consult the Yellow Pages (or a neighbor) for a local chimney sweep. It's better to call one of them now than to have to call the fire department later.

Not only that, it is required by law. Dechlorination can be achieved by simply not adding chlorine to the water and letting the water sit for several days in the sun before draining the pool. Alternatively, you may use one of several products on the market which will neutralize the chlorine. You can contact your chlorine supplier to get more information on these chemicals.

Important Information

- **Sprinkling Restrictions - Outside water usage will be restricted in the Village between May 15th and September 15th.** If your address ends in an even number (0, 2, 4, 6, 8), then you may use outside water on calendar days which are even. Similarly, if your address ends in an odd number (1, 3, 5, 7, 9), you may use outside water on calendar days which are odd.
- **Dumping in drainage ditches and detention basins is prohibited by Village Code.** A fine will be assessed to anyone in violation. Questions? Call Jennifer Hughes, Village Engineer, at 847-883-8600.
- **Waste Management North is the single waste hauler for most residents in Lincolnshire.** If you have questions or problems, the waste hauler can be reached at 800-796-9696 or 630-724-8400. However, if you are a member of a Homeowners' Association, your home is not necessarily covered by Waste Management North. Check with your Homeowners' Association for more information.
- **If you have any old major appliances you wish to discard, call Environmental Field Service at 800-480-4337.** This service will collect these appliances for a fee that is much lower than what Waste Management North would charge.
